So Long, Farewell.....

First, a true story. A few months ago I saw my family doctor for a physical exam. The doctor told me that I had gained 15 pounds since my last visit, and that my blood pressure was above normal for the first time ever. My doctor asked me: "So, have you had any extra stress in your life over the past year?" He probably wondered why I laughed so hard.

As this edition of the Interchange goes to press, I am entering my final week as St. John's Senior Warden. The 2011 Vestry and officers will take their positions on Jan. 10.

In hindsight, it seems that my entire Vestry tenure has taken place during a time of transition and turmoil within our parish. When I first joined the Vestry in 2008, we were in the midst of the search process for a new Rector. When I became Senior Warden in January of 2009, Susan Latimer had been our new Rector just five months. Ann Lovejoy Johnson also arrived at our parish that same month. Clearly our parish was embarking on a period of significant change.

I look back over the past few years with pride and satisfaction for a number of important projects. The Vestry adopted new procedures for handling church finances and implemented a payroll service to administer staff salaries, taxes and benefits. The Great Sewer & Grease Trap Project of 2009 upgraded the antiquated sewer lines for the church kitchen and first floor restrooms, ensuring our ability to continue our shared ministry with the Manna Meal program (and forever sealing my fate as "The Sewer Warden"). As we enter 2011, we await the start of a significant kitchen renovation project that will provide both Manna Meal and St. John's with a state-of-the-art commercial kitchen. And we are seeing new faces in the pews!

We've also seen improvements in our children and youth programs. The curriculum was revamped and new youth mentors were recruited. We successfully sent our high school youth on the pilgrimage to New York City. Vacation Bible School this past summer was great fun. If we want to grow our parish and attract new members, we must offer quality programs for families and children as well as adult programs.

But we've also faced difficulties. Our parish has endured significant financial challenges in recent years. Our national economy suffered the worst decline since the Great Depression. The economic decline also affected our parish finances. We will continue to face serious fiscal challenges in 2011. *(Continued on page 2)*

We hope to expand our congregation and offer the good news of God to even more people with this new offering "...in the hope that all may find a home in God's healing love".

We also survived controversy within our parish life during the past two years. A Mutual Ministry Review in early 2010 helped re-focus our Clergy's attention on the areas of pastoral care and relationships with parishioners. We addressed the situation involving Bishop Klusmeyer and Jim Lewis' license in the spring of 2010.

More recently, our Vestry listened to parishioner concerns and retained the services of consultant Susan Nienaber of The Alban Institute. As the result of her congregational assessment report, the Vestry created two new Committees of parishioners -- an Ad Hoc Committee to address the pastoral bond between the Rector and the congregation, and a Fellowship Relations Committee to address congregational behaviors and practices. Both of these Committees will be working diligently throughout 2011, and I wish both groups much success.

Prior to joining the Vestry, I had spent 14 years as a member of this parish sitting quietly in the back pew, engaged mainly in family activities with our young children. My Vestry service has allowed me wonderful opportunities to know my fellow parishioners better, as well as to learn more about our church activities and functions. I am constantly humbled at the commitment of our parishioners in fulfilling the mission of our parish life.

But Vestry service also exposed me to the distasteful world of church politics. I've learned that for a congregation which purports to be tolerant, inclusive, accepting and diverse . . . we have quite a few parishioners among our ranks who are critical, judgmental, intolerant and dismissive of other viewpoints. Parishioners who put their own personal desires ahead of others. Parishioners who thrive in a world of gossip and drama and controversy. I personally believe that our outside consultant hit the nail on the head when she cited unhealthy congregational behaviors and practices as a serious problem which must be addressed within our parish.

It has been an honor and a privilege to serve as your Senior Warden for the past two years. The experience has been rewarding and fulfilling and frustrating and infuriating and exhausting. Look for me sitting in the back pew again ... but perhaps not as quietly as before.

Vestry Creates Ad Hoc Committee

During its regular monthly meeting on Nov. 8, 2010, the Vestry of St. John's Episcopal Church approved the following motion:

The Vestry accepts the recommendations of Alban Institute Consultant Susan Nienaber (report dated Oct. 18, 2010) and hereby creates an *ad hoc* committee to work with the Vestry and with Rector Susan Latimer in an effort to improve the relationship and pastoral bond between the Rector and the congregation, as well as to mutually discern the future of Rector Latimer's ministry at St. John's.

Such *ad hoc* committee shall consist of five members -- two members recommended by the Vestry, two members recommended by Rector Latimer, and the fifth member being Rector Latimer herself. The final decision regarding committee membership will be made by consensus between the Vestry and the Rector.

The *ad hoc* committee will work together in good faith for a period of twelve months to create and implement a plan to improve the pastoral bond and relationships between Rector Latimer and the congregation, and to provide monthly feedback to Rector Latimer and to the Vestry.

The Vestry, Rector Latimer and the *ad hoc* committee will work together to establish criteria and benchmarks to be used in evaluating the progress made regarding Rector Latimer's relationship with the congregation.

At the conclusion of the twelve month period (November 2011), the Vestry, in consultation with both the *ad hoc* committee and with Rector Latimer, will evaluate the progress made as a result of these efforts, and will at that time discern the future viability of Rector Latimer's ministry at St. John's.

Manna Meal Kitchen Project Delayed

Jean Simpson of Manna Meal advises that that start of the church kitchen renovation project has been delayed again. It is hoped that construction will begin in late February or early March, and should be finished in June.

St. Nicholas Visits St. John's

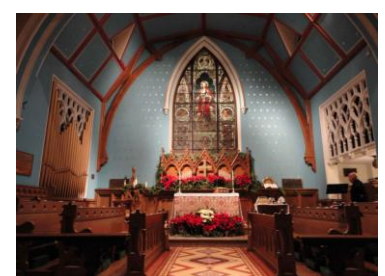

Kate Allie

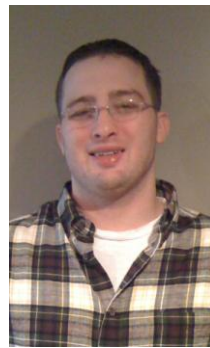

You're Being Deputized to Pass Out 'Hugs'

Almost 30 years ago, after a particularly joyous scene of hugs and kisses spread among the many wishes on Christmas Eve, I wrote an article for Interchange entitled Christmas Hugs. I stated that all during the Advent Season that Jim (Lewis) had affirmed that the process of the birthing of Jesus was at once and ongoing. I noted that, while we had just celebrated the birth of God's love into the world some 2,000 years before, the validity of Christ's birthing anew each day had been demonstrated that night by the people of St. John's in the form of Christmas hugs. (We had not yet started to call ourselves The Saints of John!)

Eight years later, inspired by a statement by Ann Bird, I wrote another article entitled Hugs II. She had told me that when she was seated in our nave and looked up, she was engulfed with the feeling that those beautiful, graceful arches above were reaching out over us, embracing ... hugging ... all who sat below!

In what has become a trend in our literary and Hollywood culture, I now offer a Hugs III, 21 years later.

I have always been somewhat of a "free spirit!" But during the past couple of years, with my situation with Tom, I have had to put somewhat of a damper on that. Now, however, in an effort to not pull the covers over my head for what is left of my life, I have unleashed that free spirit, and it has taken off running with a vengeance! And what I have discovered is that we have a host of free spirits residing within these sacred walls, just waiting to be given an invitation to be so. Thus, I don't always need to initiate those hugs. As if wearing a sign that says, I HUG, it is amazing how often I look out to see a pair of normally closed arms, open wide, waiting for me! New faces, familiar faces, old, young, male, female. I love it!

Hugs don't always have to be done with our arms. I am hugged with a phone call or card thanking me for something that I have said or done that touched a life, or when someone remembers something that I wrote 10 years before. A squeeze of my hand as I offer the chalice or the smile and eye-to-eye contact that says so much as I give the bread of life that Susan or Ann had just consecrated. A couple of new Saints among us, great young men, often reach for my hand and smile and wink as I pass by, without a word needing to be said.

The world outside these walls of our church home is just as hungry for hugs. Besides being a hugger, I am a roamer, and as I cruise through Town Center Mall, Capitol Market, or Sam's, I love to study those passing by. And the people, hungry to be noticed, respond.

In one of Susan's earliest sermons she told of a study being done on the relationship between our brain and our heart on consciousness. She said research is showing that the heart has an electromagnetic field 5,000 times stronger than that generated by the brain. Thus, when we are near one another our heart fields interact and can influence each other. (Robin McCraty, Ph.D.)

I believe that!

Space does not allow me to tell you of the many warm, eager, funny responses that I receive from people as I reach out to them, either with words, or just my eyes. A void in my life is being filled by someone I have never seen before nor will ever see again. And when a clerk says "Hello, BJ" when I walk into a store, (most often just to look around), I know that we have "hugged" each other before.

A couple of my church family said to me on Christmas Eve that they were declaring me to be the Official Dispenser of Hugs at St. John's. So to conclude, I am taking advantage of that title to deputize ALL who read this (and all who don't) to go, not only to each other in this holy place called St. John's Church, but out beyond our red doors, and give hugs ... of any sort to a world of saints, those in high places, low places and all in between, hungry just to be seen, noticed, accepted and appreciated, and hugged by God, through us, for that is whose work we are to do. *Amen.*
